TASK A

Include:

- a. how these policies and practices affect the various operations/departments of the hospital
- b. as well as how they are/will affect your practice as a technologist.

TASK B

Select a culture (not your own) and:

- a. interview a person(s) who is(are) knowledgeable about that culture, and/or
- b. research that culture using written or video skills.

In your report, focus on aspects of that culture as they may effect how you interact with patients of that culture or perform your job. Some areas to consider are:

- concepts of time
- family roles
- religion
- appropriate dress
- language
- non-verbal communication

You may want to include information about possible barriers to oral communication and give some specific advice on how to facilitate inter-cultural communication in that group.
