This course provides the business student with a basic knowledge of Canadian law including the workings of the legal system, and the law of contracts, torts, sale of goods, consumer protection, secured transactions, creditors' remedies, employment, agency, partnership, companies, real estate, patents and intellectual property including, patent, trade mark and copyright.

Course Learning Outcomes & Sub-Outcomes: At the end of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. To recognize legal issues as they arise;
- 2. To learn to apply the rules of law to business situations;
- 3. To be able to communicate effectively with lawyers and regulators, and to have a basic knowledge of the law;
- 4. To have an understanding of how to design business practices and transactions to avoid legal problems;
- 5. To have a general understanding of the law as it applies in business situations, with a particular emphasis on legal issues relating to computers.

Course Notes:

Students will study the topics covered in the text, <u>Business Law in Canada</u>, according to the schedule as set out in the course outline attached in Part B.

Each week there will be two lectures of one hour each and a one-hour seminar. Seminars will be used for discussion of the material covered and for student presentations.

Cases in the casebook will be studied as examples of the application of legal principles. Students will present their own analyses of the cases in the seminar hour. For examination purposes, students are responsible for all material covered in the text, lectures and seminars.

Instructors are available to assist students during the office hours posted at our offices, as well as by appointment. Please feel free to call at any time at the above noted telephone numbers, or to send an e-mail.

Mid-term exams will be held during lecture periods, and designated exam periods, and will be reviewed in seminars. Every effort will be made to follow the attached schedule, however changes may be required due to school events.
