Course Description

This course introduces the basic principals and methods of joining wood, metals and plastics. Methods covered will include solvent cementing of plastics, gluing and clamping of woods, soldering, brazing and fusion welding of steel.

The goal of the course is to provide an introduction to the theory and practice necessary to perform basic joining processes for woods, plastics and metals.
